QUESTIONS & ACTIVITIES

1. Grab your handy-dandy Kentucky map and locate the following 2 towns featured in Chapter 6:
 - 1) Jeffersontown (Hint: J-town is a tiny bit east of Louisville, so it might be easier to locate Louisville first.)
 - 2) Hazard (Hint: Hazard is in the southeastern part of Kentucky. If you're still having trouble finding it, here's an easier way: Find Lexington, follow I-75 South to London, then follow the Hal Rogers Parkway East to Hazard.)

2. Now that you've located J-town and Hazard, trace your finger over the following route the family took to get from J-town to Hazard. (Note: It's a different route than the route mentioned in #1.)
 - J-town
 - I-64 East all the way to Winchester
 - Bert Combs Mountain Parkway
 - Highway 15 South
 - Hazard

3. Let's pretend you are selling lemonade at your family's yard sale. To prepare, you spend the following:
 - \$5 for lemonade mix
 - \$3 for ice
 - \$2 for cups
 - \$3 for markers and poster board to advertise

Question: How much are your total expenses?

You're selling one cup of lemonade for \$1.

Question: How many cups of lemonade will you need to sell to break even?

Question: How many cups of lemonade will you need to make a profit?

You sell 16 cups of lemonade, and one lady also gives you a \$5 tip.

Question: How much was your profit?
